# BRIDGING HEALTH DISPARITIES TO ADDRESS THE OPIOID EPIDEMIC

## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The state of Rhode Island (RI) is experiencing an epidemic of substance misuse. Recent reports illustrate that across the nation, RI has the highest rate of illicit drug use by adults, and the highest rate of drug overdose deaths in the Northeast. This data indicates a large unmet need for individuals with substance misuse in RI. Despite a high unmet need, further education for health professionals is necessary to reduce substance misuse, which often disproportionately affects underserved individuals. This symposium will focus on the pressing issue of opioid misuse in our region. Through various breakout sessions, this event will explore the intersection of opioid addiction and health disparities in our community and statewide.
